#### Review: last year's aims and outcomes

These outcomes have been impacted Covid-19.

Aim	Outcome
Close the gap in attainment	The gap has not widened. Overall attainment for PP and Non-PP has increased.
Improve attendance for disadvantaged pupils	No change in attendance for disadvantaged children (up to December 2019, before Covid outbreak)
Improve reading and maths outcomes	Predicted 2019 results showed a 9% increase for disadvantaged pupils meeting the expected standard at KS2 and 1% increase in KS1 and a 28% increase achieving GLD
Develop cultural capital through wide range of experiences	Children have had launch lessons and curriculum days and a topic based curriculum provided.
